With the implementation of the new national grading scheme with 1-9 replacing grades A*-G at GCSE and new syllabus in the majority of subjects, much has been put in place to ensure our students can achieve their highest grades possible. As a focus on achieving grades 7-9, the Academy introduced a higher ability entitlement plan. This plan ensures that all students have access to the resources, support and tools they need to achieve the highest grades at GCSE. Support is evident in every curriculum area and examples include a fantastic after school Maths Peer tuition club, where Y10 students tutor Y7 & 8 students. Other examples include specific teaching techniques to boost independence skills, as well as our Year 11 tuition program.

One of the most important keys to success is revision. Our termly assessments, called 'Spiral Assessments', test students on not only work completed in one term, but of all the previous terms. We do this to prepare our students for what is to come in Year 11, where they will be tested on all content and skills from the beginning of the key stage. You can find help and resources to help support your child in revising for spiral assessments on our website. See our Parents section, click on 'Examinations' and in here you will find lots of revision information and support.

In addition to the higher ability support, we have increased the support for Year 11's in the final year of their GCSE's. In the last newsletter our students were preparing for their first set of mocks which were completed in December. Results appeared positive, but to ensure our students achieve the highest grade possible, we have increased the level of support available. Support includes an increased tuition provision; nightly after school subject classes; Year 10 & 11 study area (now open from 3-5pm Mon – Thurs); February half term classes; Easter classes, to name a few. Our last Year 11 mock exams begin straight after the February half term and the timetable can be found on the website by clicking on 'Parents/Examinations/Y11 Mock Exam Information'.

I would also like to invite you to our next Parent Forum Event, which will be held on Thursday 28 March from 6pm. The theme will be 'Reading & Revision', where staff will discuss with parents our Reading Strategy, as well as showing some useful revision techniques parents can use to support their students in upcoming spiral assessments and examinations. We hope to see you there.

Excel Academy Community Council

Senior Student Executives met with Councillor Powell-Beckett and PCSO Andy Cadman this half term to discuss plans for Sneyd Green Community Centre on nearby Ralph Drive. The Councillor has plans to upgrade the facility and make it the hub of Community activity once more, and has called on students from the Academy to be involved.

Students visited the Centre to have a look around and form ideas for improvements, and over the coming weeks the students will be making suggestions on how to revitalise the centre, and will be looking at various forms of media to advertise the centre and kick-start the project.

PSHE Day – 18 January 2018

The students enjoyed a range of age appropriate PSHE sessions on our drop down day this half term. Year 7 and Year 8 students had lessons on identifying 'What Outstanding Learning Looks Like' as well as Growth Mindset sessions and a focus on Developing Resilience. Year 9 were visited by the local authority Sexual Health team to discuss Healthy Relationships and also received lessons raising awareness of Mental Health issues. Meanwhile Year 10 students were visited by our educational partner 'Elevate Education' for an enlightening seminar focused on improving study skills, and Year 11 were visited by another external agency, 'Positively Mad' which provided the students with memory techniques that can be implemented in their forthcoming mock exams. In addition, representatives from our local colleges and the Careers Advice service worked with Year 11 to complete college applications as Post 16 plans for our senior students are finalised.

Independent Learning

As part of our 'Growth Mindset' agenda we encourage the students to take responsibility for their own learning. If they find something a 'struggle' this is ok, learning is at its best when the students have to employ their thinking skills and problem solving techniques.

Linked to this is taking responsibility for their personal organisation. At Excel, students have to be fully equipped and as you know there are a number of compulsory equipment items that are checked everyday:

Academy planner, pencil case (including a pencil, black pen, green pen), reading book, calculator and school bag. After half term we will be expecting students to take responsibility for their essential writing tools, therefore should the students not have the most basic equipment (ie a pen) then they will have the opportunity to purchase one from the stationery stall that will be open during registration everyday. We ask that parents and carers support the Academy and ensure that your children attend the Academy ready to learn everyday.



To and From the Academy – Do you know where your child is?

The Academy takes responsibility for the behaviour of our students in the local community, not just during Academy hours. We expect behaviour in the community to be as excellent as it is when students are at school, and we ask that parents/carers reinforce the expectations when your children are travelling to and from school. We have received information from staff at McDonald's Norton Heights that students from Excel are on occasion behaving in an antisocial manner when they visit the restaurant on their way home. The Academy will be working closely with McDonald's and consequences will be issued to any students who are behaving in an unacceptable manner.

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First Day Calls Procedure

Dear Parent/Carer,

I am writing to make you aware of the Academy procedure for children who have unexplained absences from school.



There have been public cases in the past where schools have not chased up the reasons as to why children are absent. It has then transpired that there have been tragic circumstances around these absences, e.g. illness of a parent and a child unable to seek help.

We will do everything we can to prevent such situations occurring, and I am sure you would agree that your child's safety is paramount to us all.

If your child is not going to be in school, please call the absence line on 01782 882700 opt 1 to report their absence. Please do this before 8am on the first day of the absence, and every day they are absent thereafter.

If we have not heard from you by 10am then we will start to call all the contact numbers that you have provided in order to gain an explanation for the absence. If we still have not been able to ascertain where your child is then we will make a home visit. However, if we still haven't been able to get a response then we will report it to the police as your child will then be classed a 'missing child'.

This procedure is to ensure that we know where your child is and that you are all safe. Please let us know in good time why your child is absent from school. If you would like to talk to me about this please make an appointment to see me.

It is vital that we have all of your correct contact details on our system. If you need to update them, please request a Data Collection Form from Main Reception.

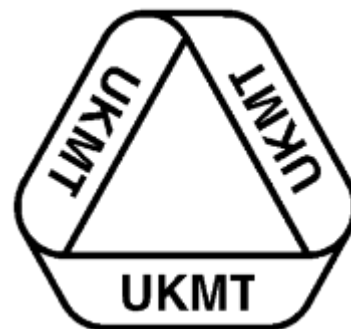
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UKMT Mathematics Challenge

Year 11 Mock Exam Arrangements

The Year 11 mock exams are taking place for 2 weeks:
week 1 w/c 26 February (Week B)
week 2 w/c 05 March (Week A)

The exam timetable is up in student Form Rooms and on the noticeboard in Student Reception. Students will also have a copy of the Exam and Revision timetable.

It is important that students make a note of their exam dates and times in their planner. Students may not be sitting in the same seat for each exam so it is important to make a note of their seat number as well.

Also it is important to make sure students have all of their equipment for each exam. The equipment they will need is:

- ballpoint pen – BLACK ink only – no gel pens or fountain pens
- pencil – for diagrams and charts only
- ruler
- pencil sharpener
- eraser
- protractor, compass (maths exams)
- highlighter – English exam (remember to only highlight the question not your answer)
- calculator – remember to put the calculator lid under the desk on the floor in the exam room
- a clear pencil case
- Reminder: Student Must Not write their answers in pencil

Students may take into the exam room a bottle of water which must be clear with no labels on it.

Reminder to Students:

Before you enter the exam room you must make sure:

- your mobile phone is switched off and any alarms disabled and put in your bag
- if you have a smart watch it is switched off and put in your bag
- if you have a wrist watch put it in your
